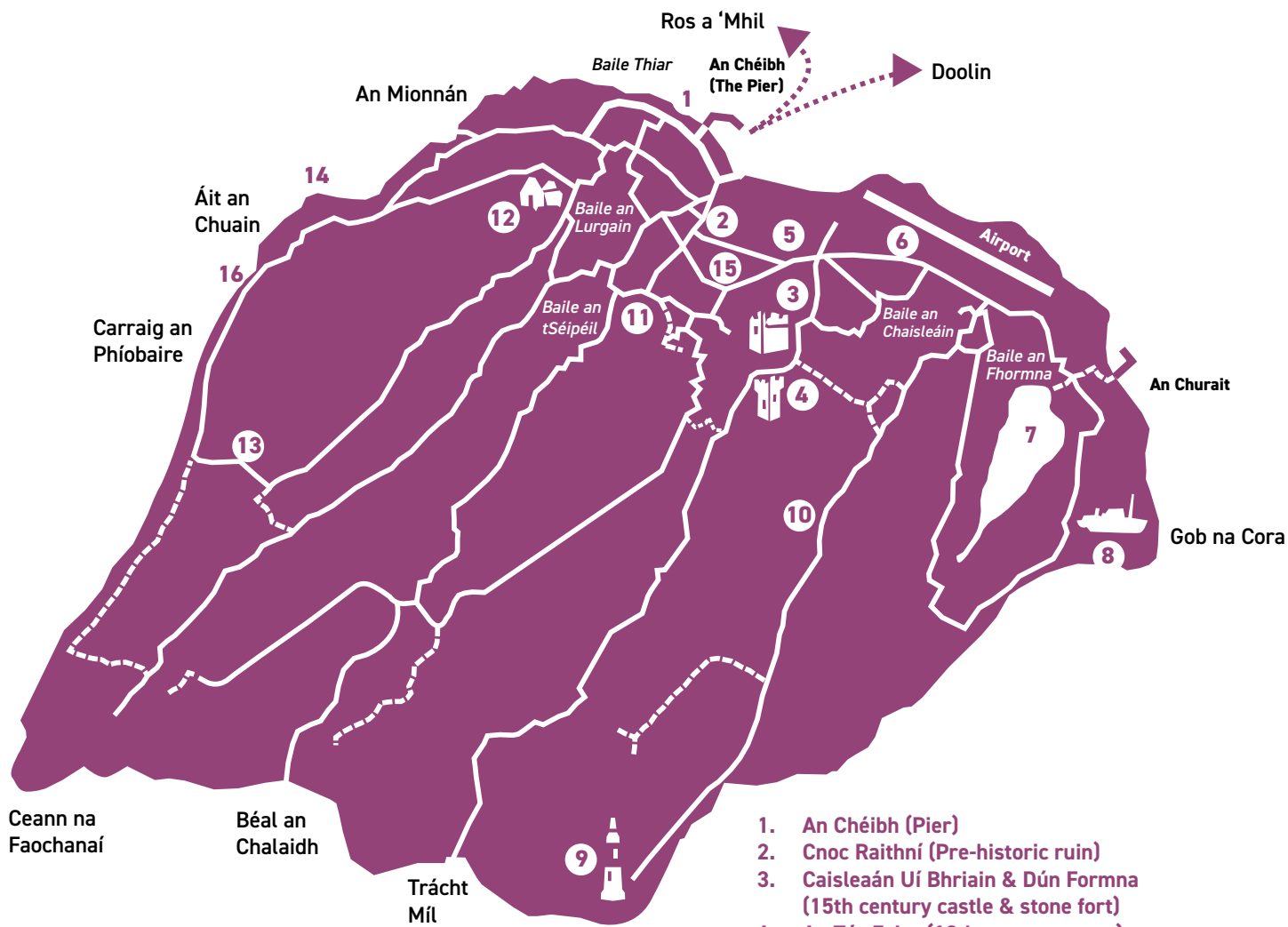

The workshop will include the building of a unique Aran Islands dry stone wall. The range and intensity of dry stone wall types and styles on the Aran Islands is probably unparalleled with anywhere else in the world.

This workshop will suit both experienced dry stone wallers and learners.

Important notice: Steel toe cap footwear and protective gloves are mandatory.

Please bring suitable outdoor clothing as the weather can be unpredictable.

It is recommended that attendees bring their own walling hammer or a 1.5kg or 2kg lump hammer.

WHICH COURSE SHOULD I CHOOSE?

Bring ideas that appeal, or be inspired by the surroundings when you are here.

Both workshops are suitable for participants with no experience and some. Whether you are dipping your toe for the first time or need encouragement in furthering your skills, this is the place to be, in an atmosphere of fun, fellowship guided by experienced instructors.

Stone Carving

Relief carving: This will be fun and is the easiest carving technique to master. Low relief carving with textured backgrounds. Designs can be carved on a panel or a small block of stone. Inspiration will be taken from being on the island, sea or nature. Create a beautiful carved object as a lasting memento.

Carving in the round: A stone bowl scooped out and rounded and if time allows it can be decorated with relief carving or lettering. Or a simple abstract animal form should be possible to make over the weekend and if not completed it will be well on the way and can be finished at home later.

The above are suggestions but if you have an idea in mind do bring it along for consideration. The most important thing to learn will be the techniques, these skills will last a lifetime.

RECOMMENDED TOOLS TO BRING

Tools can also be purchased from R J GOUGH'S onsite shop.

Essential PPE: Safety boots/shoes. Comfortable work clothes. Pencils, sharpener, ruler .
Dummy hammer 600grm, lump hammer 1000grm, steel or tungsten carbide point ½" or 5/8" Guillet Fort tungsten carbide carving chisels 4mm, 8mm, 12mm, claw chisel 20mm, tungsten carbide scriber.

Estimated cost of tools: 175 euo. A limited number of tools will be available on loan for the workshop.

Stone for your project is included in your course fee. A selection of stone types and sizes will be available to choose from.

This workshop invites you to make your mark by exploring the medium of the carved letterform. You will be guided through the basics of drawing letterforms, layout design, lettercutting techniques, and the use and care of chisels. It is suggested, though by no means necessary, that you have a small project in mind before coming on workshop. Often best results are achieved with a specific goal in mind.

RECOMMENDED TOOLS TO BRING

Tools can also be purchased from R J GOUGH'S onsite shop.

Essential PPE: Safety boots/shoes. Comfortable work clothes. Pencils, sharpener, ruler .
Lettercarving: Dummy hammer 600grm, Guillet Europ lettering chisels 4mm, 6mm & 8mm.

Biographies



Kevin Carrigan

Kevin Carrigan is a bricklayer/stonemason with 37 years experience. He has worked on the restoration of a diverse range of projects including religious and military buildings, bridges, walled gardens, farm buildings, cottages,

follies etc. When the lime renaissance began he was one of the first to start their re-use. Initially lime was a small part of his works, but over the years this has grown and nowadays he works exclusively with lime.



Eddie Farrelly

Eddie Farrelly is a traditional dry stone waller/stone mason from Co Cavan, now based in Dublin. He is a long-serving member of the Dry Stone Wall Association of Ireland. He instructs at dry stone workshops throughout

Ireland and abroad.

The scenic beauty of the well-maintained dry stone farm walls, stone faced earth ditches and stone buildings which enhanced his childhood landscape instilled in him a passion for the promotion, protection and conservation of Ireland's dry stone heritage. He has a keen interest in the underrated benefits of dry stone wall habitats and the ecological value that they represent.

While respecting the ancestral traditions of the artisans of our dry stone heritage, he takes particular pleasure in sharing knowledge and skills at community workshops so that the craft may be safeguarded into the future. He attributes most of his learned skills to his inspirational mentor, Master Stone Mason and Author, Patrick McAfee. Eddie was awarded a BSc Degree in Applied Conservation Skills from SETU Waterford, a National Crafts Certificate in Metal Fabrication from TU Dublin and he holds a Stonescaping Certificate.

He has extensive experience in working with traditional lime mortars, earth mortars and cob for the conservation and restoration of historic buildings and structures and he enjoys demonstrating how to cook limestone for the production of traditional quicklime.



Tom Little

Tom Little comes from a family tradition of working stone going back generations. He considers his father, stonecutter Ted Little and sculptor/lettering artist Michael Biggs important early influences. Exploring the possibilities of material

and letterform, he works as a stonecarver, lettering artist, drystone waller, product designer and trainer.

Tom Little has completed commissions for public and private clients and exhibited widely. He has designed and created a successful product range of lettering pieces for Wild Goose Studio. He was a craft judge for the annual RDS Craft Competition 2012-2014.

Since 1992, Tom Little has designed and run courses in stonecutting, stone carving and drystone wall construction, for Kerry Education & Training Board with many of his students going on to make successful careers in stone working.

Currently he is delivering the national Stonecutting and Stonemasonry Apprenticeship training programme.



Aileen Anne Brannigan

Aileen Anne Brannigan is a Stone Carver, Letter Carver, and Sculptor is a native of Kilkenny City where she is based.

Her stone working career began in 1982 with a four-year apprenticeship as a stonecutter, after which the art of letter carving

was studied extensively in the UK.

Practical experience was gained working in Quarry workshops, Stone yards and Marble works, and as assistant to sculptors and letter carvers.

Her creative work will mostly include abstract animal sculpture and hand carved lettering. Commissioned work to date includes, Celtic Crosses, Per Cent for Art Commissions and public and private memorials.

She has been involved in the creation of several high-profile monuments; A Celtic cross of her creation stands in McMahon Street Quebec City honouring the people of Quebec caring for Irish famine victims.

In Glasnevin Cemetery... The National Famine Memorial, The France Ireland Memorial, and unveiled in July this year the Civil War Monument commissioned by the Department of Defence.

Aileen Anne has a studio workshop in Kilkenny where she makes and creates. She teaches stone carving part time at an addiction treatment centre in Kildare, and with the Kilkenny Carlow ETB in Windgap.

This is Aileen's second year to teach at the Feile na gCloch festival on the island of Inis Oírr and it is a highlight of her working year.



Eoin Madigan

Eóin Madigan is a sixth generation Stone Mason and lime practitioner from the Burren region of Co. Clare. His Family has a long tradition of working with stone that stretches back at least 200 years that they know of. It is said they followed the Church building from

the East to the West Coast of Ireland. They then settled in a small town called Kilfanora where they set up their workshop making headstones and architectural pieces on request. Eoin is passionate about conserving our built heritage and in particular the mortars used to build them. In 2005 he completed a nine-month dry stone walling and stone cutting course run by master craftsman Tom Little in Tralee Co. Kerry. From there he became an active member of The Buildings limes forum Ireland and again, under the guidance of master craftsman Pat McAfee he gained his knowledge and love for historic mortars..



David Curtin

David Curtin is a Lahinch based stonecutter, stone carver and dry stone waller who has just finished his apprenticeship under the guidance of Tom Little in Kerry, 2018-2023. He was first driven towards stone in 2016,

whilst living in Australia where he travelled the country building walking and biking tracks, dry stone bridges, paths and more. For the last four years he has been

working with Eoin Madigan, a sixth-generation stone mason, at Madigan Traditional Masonry (MTM). Here he has explored the world of conservation masonry and lime mortar practices which focuses on maintaining Ireland's ancient and historical buildings. David also involved with SPAB Ireland helping to spread awareness on how to maintain and protect Ireland's built heritage.



Fergus Packman

Fergus is a Dry stone waller from Connemara, Ireland

Trained with the National Trust on the Ysbyty estate in Snowdonia, North Wales. Now based in Connemara working with the local granites and limestone of the area.

Rónán Crehan



Rónán Crehan, Inis Oírr Clochan Project. is a Brick/Stone layer by trade and originally from Co. Meath. Rónán completed his apprenticeship in Brick/Stone laying in 1994, working on many building sites as a brick/Stone layer in Dublin.

Rónán then moved to Co.

Donegal just over twenty years ago and over the course of that time, he has worked as a stone mason contractor and also a Drystone walling instructor until he joined the Office of Public Works five years ago. Rónán works in the heritage services in the preservation and maintenance of the national monuments of Ireland.

Rónán is also a member of the Dry Stone Walling Association of Ireland and helps run dry stone walling workshops for land owners and anyone who is interested in learning the skills of the craft.

Rónán has been influenced by people he has met at Feile na gCloch and other Stone festivals over the years and has gained a lot of knowledge and improved his skills because of it.

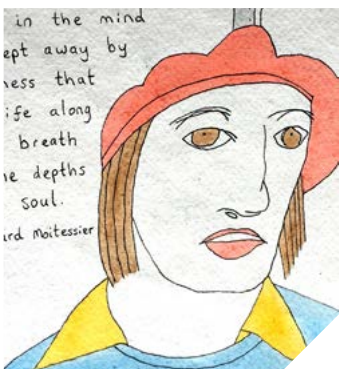

Michael McGroarty



Michael McGroarty is third generation Stone Mason and Monumental Sculptor in his native Mountcharles, Co. Donegal, living there with his wife Mairead and 3 children. Michael is recognised for his quality workmanship and highest standards in all kinds of stone work and is highly regarded in the industry by Dry Stone Wall enthusiasts.

Michael is involved in the production and installation of headstones in County Donegal and all surrounding counties, and is most especially well known for his craftsmanship in producing unique and exceptional headstones from local sandstone and one of only a few nowadays able to undertake the craft of lead lettering. Other fine examples of Michael's work in Co. Donegal are Donegal County Council Public Art projects including Standing Stones Monument 2001 – 3.2m in height made from Mountcharles Sandstone, the standing stones are a reinterpretation of the idea of an enclosure of stones seen in stone forts, clustered towards the centre and radiating outwards. Another of note is The Map Wall, Barnesmore Gap, again 2001 and a DCC PA project consisting of 8 panels of Mountcharles Sandstone showing Co. Donegal and all place names of the John O'Donovan County Survey of 1893. Other recent works of note include conservation and restoration work of listed Pier Walls and steps at Ramelton Quay wall, Moville Pier, Mountcharles Pier, and Creevy Pier Ballyshannon. Furthermore and of note is conservation work of Ecclesiastical buildings including Church of Ireland Donegal, and currently consolidation of stone work of Old Kilbarron Church, also Ballyshannon. Michael has been a member of Tironaill Dry Stone Wall Association and for over a decade a friend to many of the DSW groups throughout the country. With preservation of our Irish landscape at heart Michael is a regular at DSW events helping to promote and preserve our dry stone wall heritage for future generations through facilitation of workshops and stone wall building at the many DSW festivals across Ireland, passing on his experience, learnings and skill-set to DSW enthusiast, Ireland and beyond. This year Michael – being recognised for his excellent craftsmanship - was kindly invited by our DSW colleagues in Austria to show and share his skill set and knowledge there to European, Asian and American students.

Rainer Vogler | Austria



Rainer works at the wine school Krems, where he started reviving the in Austria nearly lost art of DSW by organising courses 20 years ago. In 2023, due to his initiative the DSW School Austria was founded, consisting of 16 trainers and offering workshops all over Austria and in Germany.

Rainer's favourite DSW activities include children's workshops and work with rough stones, e.g. at alpine projects. Everyone can see his efforts of spreading the handicraft at several films about DSW at www.landimpulse.at. Rainer has two adult children, of whom one is skilful at working with wood, the other with metal, while his partner is a farmer – so the family covers a diversity of elements.

Helmut Schieder | Austria

Eva is a Historian and journalist, working for the Ministry of Culture and is the Andorran focal point for the UNESCO 2003 Convention.

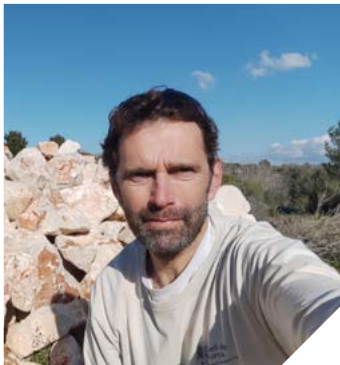
Antonia Theodosiou | Cyprus
